

HOW YOU CAN HELP FORTUNE TELLER

There are ways you can help prevent any further decline in the North Atlantic right whale population. This fortune teller will tell you simple ways you can make a difference. Show your new game to family and friends and share what you have learned on how to protect the right whale.

Instructions:



Step 1: Color in your whales the color specified (blue, gray, black, and purple). Color in the other images as you chose.



Step 2: Start with a square piece of paper by cutting at the line below.



Step 3: Fold the square paper in half on both sides. Now unfold and turn the paper over with the creases facing up.



Step 4: Fold each corner point of the square to the Center point. Turn over the folded square so the back is facing up towards you and repeat on this side of the square as well.



Step 5: Fold your new square in half, both ways so you end up with a small square. Now open up the last fold so you have a rectangle.



Step 6: Place your index fingers and thumbs under open flaps, now push up to form a pyramid shape.

Here is how you play the game:





























Step 1: Hold the fortune teller and ask a friend to choose one of the colors shown.

Step 2: Spell out the chosen color by opening and closing the fortune teller, and stop.

Step 3: Have your friend choose one of the numbers shown. Count out that number by opening and closing the fortune teller, and stop. Then repeat.

Step 5: Have your friend choose one last number. Open the flap beneath that number and read one of the ways your friend can help Right Whales!

|  <p>Gray</p> |  <p>5</p> <p>Keep a look out on boats: right whales are hard to see but can be identified by their "v" shaped blow.</p> |  <p>6</p> <p>Slow Down If you are in a boat and see a right whale, slow down! Many right whales die or are injured from boat collisions every year.</p> |  <p>Blue</p> |
|  <p>4</p> <p>Don't litter! Right whales can eat and become entangled in trash. It is very important not to litter, and to remove trash and other marine debris found in the water.</p> |     |     <p>Don't Approach If you are in the ocean, be sure to always stay 500 yards away from a right whale. If a whale swims towards you, be sure to swim away.</p> |  <p>7</p> <p>Recycle Reduce trash in the right whales' ocean habitat by raising awareness of recycling in your community. You can even start up a local beach clean-up.</p> |
|  <p>3</p> <p>Spread the word to surfers, kayakers and boaters that we should stay far away from right whales so that we do not disturb their natural behaviors.</p> |     <p>Tell others about the importance of the coastal water of the eastern United States to right whales and why vessel operators need to use caution.</p> |     <p>Be sure to recycle your old or broken monofilament fishing line. Encourage other fishermen to recycle line and remove all nets from the water.</p> |  <p>8</p> |
